A. Monthly Activities

On 20 November 2006, the General Assembly, recognizing that reconciliation processes are particularly necessary and urgent in countries and regions of the world which had suffered, or were suffering, situations of conflict that had affected and divides societies in their various internal, national and international facets, proclaimed 2009 the International Year of Reconciliation (A/61/L.22).

The resolution invites concerned governments and international and non-governmental organizations to support reconciliation processes and to plan and implement adequate cultural, educational and social programmes including holding conferences and seminars and disseminating information about the issue.

A Year Plan for the International Reconciliation Year 2009 was created by the Foundation for Subjective Experience and Research, S.E.R.

Film-making contest depicting historical events or human experiences with reconciliation message which will be handed by award-winning personalities.

E. Musical Presentation

KIMUKU musical presentation and the awarding of Plaque of Appreciation to be handed out by High Government personality/ties.



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Higher Vision



Enactment of a Reconciliation Code of Ethics

Reconciliation is a higher vision and a sound state of mind that should go beyond personal subjective level and into daily life as the highest form of dialogue to activate complementary mental attitudes,

amongst individuals (man/woman), families, schools and churches, governments, non-governmental organisations and communities, regional and international, at large.

Its ethical value is an indispensable precondition of any sustainable development as perceived by the UN MDGs: freedom, equality, solidarity, tolerance, love of nature and sharing.

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The Ethical Reconciliation Plan to Eradicate Extreme Poverty

Best Practice

Reconciliation to eradicate extreme poverty demands new structures and a change of paradigma in economics to uplift human dignity.

We propose:

The One hundred (100) richest companies or private men in every country should invest a certain percentage of their fortune in educational and climate change program which promote:

- more education for girls in certain countries
- no child labour fair trade
- strengthen the Global-Compact Initiative

In an examplary way CERBERUS Capital Management L.P., an international investment company with Head in New York, has already started with Best Practice methods in Germany.

CERBERUS Germany, Chief Operating Officer David Knower, has created 600 apprentices jobs in six German cities. Invested were six millions Euros for rather disadvantaged young people, due to immigrant status and lack of academic training.

St. Martin, a symbol of SHARING **A WORLD VISION** to eradicate extreme poverty

- bronce statue by Uwe Brecht -

The developing path of mankind, symbolized in the form of a spiral, reaching from the past, where there is the origin of the idea of sharing, to the present, that means the children of the World, taking this indispensable virtue of sharing the resources and sharing them in peace and justice, so that everyone has enough for living and with that, building a new World of Peace, symbolized by the Dove of Peace on "Mother Earth" in the middle.

St. Martin was a rich man who shared his wealth with the poor in humility and dignity, symbolized by a marvellous coat he shared. Born 316 in Sabaria, Hungaria, he became a Christian in France when he was baptised by Archbishop Hilarius de Poitiers, after he had shared his coat with a beggar. Sharing and caring for those in need he spent his life and founded the St. Martin Monastery in Tours, where he died in 397. November 11th is his remembrance day.

The idea is that if everybody, who has enough, shares his wealth with those, who need help, there will be peace on earth, as extreme poverty will be eradicated then.

Uwe Brecht shows the poor as **children of the world**, children of all continents, each with one element of nature, which is necessary for living, like water, bread/food, air, sun/climate and tree for nature in general, and in the other hand the shared value/wealth of St. Martin, connecting them all, as children are most vulnerable and ready to esteem nature and its treasures (clear water and air, food, a.s.o.) without possessiveness. **They** are the future.

The bronce statue, standing on a marble plinth, is a model for a life-size sculpture with a well/water running along the spiral and around the World of Peace. The model measures

in height 0.35m, width 0,78m, depths 0,48m. **Uwe Brecht**, born 1958 in Berlin, Germany, has been foundation member from the very beginning of the Foundation for Subjective Experience and Research S.E.R. in 1996, by that time called S.E.R. Joint Foundation Germany.




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The cross as a symbol for all human beings coming from the North, South, East and West and bringing their cultures and experiences to the center/UN.

S.E.R. Proposed Resolution Creating UN NGO Department

DNGO - Department of Non-Governmental Organizations

"A RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO THE UN GENERAL ASSEMBLY THE CREATION OF THE DEPARTMENT OF NON- GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS (DNGO), WHO SHALL BE HEADED BY AN ASSISTANT UNDERSECRETARY, OUT OF EXISTING NGO OFFICES TO UP-GRADE, RESTRUCTURE AND/OR RATIONALIZE POLICY IMPLEMENTATIONS"

WHEREAS, on the 21 Nov. 2006 in an interactive forum on General Assembly and non-governmental organization relations the following emerged:

- **1.** The Partnership between the United Nations and NGOs is vital to the success of the UN in achieving its goals.
- NGOs bring vision and information to UN meetings and contribute to UN-efforts operationally, financially, and in terms of public awareness and support.
- **3.** NGO participation in UN meetings and processes is complimentary, not contradictory, to the UN's inter-governmental structure whereby Member States are the sole decisionmakers.

Promoting: Teatro La Luna, **Cordoba/Argentina**

This project was founded by two women from a poor district in Cordoba in 1984. Here, art provides a way for people to connect with life and with each other. In addition, performing in art enables people to assimilate traumata caused by violence and poverty. Teatro La Luna mainly focuses on children and young adults. The aim is to teach them artistic skills that will enable them to develop a professional perspective on life.





The street becomes a school

Putting on an amateur show to express feelings, experiences and questions.

Regular meetings of the children on the plaza for painting, producing sculptures, plasticize and telling stories.

Education is the starting point and basis for reducing poverty. The street becomes a school where various activities take place.



Staging the play sopa, pan y arte, "soup, bread and art" is one of these activities: soup and other food donated by grocery stores is prepared with the help of the neighbours and distributed after the play.

Helping each other helps to reduce poverty

Theatre workshops, e.g. topic "Respect towards life"

Campaign to take care of oneself and the environment, e.g. not to depo-





Walking on stilts, juggling, yoga.

Music on the pavement: guitar- and percussion course for children and adolescents of the streets.

Public library. The neighbours can lend books for free. The books are handed back after a week.

Non-violent video films: reflection on the movies showed.

Family theatre in the street. Topics and texts are used that relate to the participant's own life and suggest a constructive future.

The conscious dealing with consumption is stimulated with the aid of the theatre.

Street sewing: a group of women of all ages meets in the street. They mend the clothes of the children or of families who are most in need.

Exchanging of recipes among the women, reflecting on healthy food. Finding possibilities to cook with little money.

The children's school for arts and crafts

Was established with the aid of the S.E.R. Foundation in the countryside near Cosquin. It mainly enables local children who spend the majority of their lives in the street the contact with nature.

Meetings of elderly people and children. The elderly show the children how to sew and knit. Little puppets are made together.

Learning to enjoy ethnic diffe-

rences, getting to know other customs and learning to respect them: e.g. people from Bolivia or Peru are exposed to discrimination in Argentina.

Street games on a shut off road, meetings of "disabled" and "non-disabled" children. Playing together and learning from each other.

Actors educated by the Teatro La Luna learn techniques with the goal to disconnect from their ego and to reach their deep inner potential. The students put themselves into action in the social projects.

The school promotes artistic activities and crafts as an opportunity for a source of income for the future.

Lessons will be offered in: Forging, producing furniture from recycled material, weaving, literary writing, painting and theatre.

Furthermore, the children learn: to develop self esteem, to offer respect towards others and nature, to value their indigenous origin and to profit from their ancestors' abilities.
